It is with sadness that we share the passing of Adelle Abramson Shaw. Adelle passed peacefully on the evening of May 4, 2018 in her home in Houston, Texas after a long and valiant struggle with cancer. She was 74. Adelle was a real estate broker in both Texas and Louisiana. She was a member of the Houston Association of Realtors and participated actively in the Houston Independent Real Estate Broker's Association (HIREBA). She earned her Bachelor of Art's degree from Neucomb College, now part of Tulane University in New Orleans, Louisiana. She earned a Master's of Business Administration from the University of Houston. Adelle lived in Houston for over 50 years. She was a strong and capable businesswoman and dealt with numerous residential and commercial real estate transactions over her long career, including throughout her difficult illness. Shaw, her son Dr. Erik Tabakin Shaw who practices medicine at the Shepherd Center in Atlanta, Georgia and Dr. Chad Abramson Shaw of Baylor College of Medicine and Baylor Genetics here in Houston. Adelle is

also survived by her daughters-in-law Mrs. Lali Hughes Shaw and Mrs. Anat Kelman Shaw. Adelle cherished her five grandchildren Noa, Ella, Livia, Talia and new baby Wex.
